An Eye on Council with Sonya Roote

Greetings Saugeen! It's been a little while since I last reported on Council updates. I wanted to wait until we got our committees up and running smoothly and there were real updates to be had.

I know that this past year has been an incredibly difficult one for many families, as well as for our whole community. At this time, drugs seem to be taking over in Saugeen for so many people. We are losing our children and family members to overdoses at an alarming rate and it only seems to be getting worse. This term, I decided to choose the portfolios that could deal with our addiction epidemic in a meaningful way, as that's where my heart is. Of course, there are many other important issues we are working on as well but none as scary and dangerous as the invasion of killer drugs. Don't worry, my update includes many positive messages and we need to focus on the positive so that we still have hope. We need hope, now more than ever. So, here's what I know...

Treatment/Wellness Center - We are now in the process of having an appraisal done on a property that we are looking at to house our very own treatment center. I proposed this idea to Chief and Council after I took a tour of the property and buildings on it. It's a great structure for the purpose and it's practically ready to move in, if we do purchase it. Hopefully we get the appraisal back soon so that we can further pursue this idea. We realize that getting a licensed treatment center up and running could take a long time with all of the guidelines, laws and red tape involved. There's nothing stopping us from opening a "Wellness Center" while we go through the process though. At this time, getting into a treatment center anywhere, takes approximately 6 months after all of the initial paperwork is done. As we all know, that's 6 months too long. Our people need help now and, while they wait, we end up losing more of our people to drugs. Let's keep our fingers crossed that we can move on this as quickly as possible.

Policing – Our Police Committee, Herman, Letitia and myself, have been working with the Federal and Provincial governments to start the process of getting community police back in Saugeen. In our discussions we have been informed of the steps needed to join the First Nations Policing Program. Firstly, we need to send letters to both Federal and Provincial governments to request funding under the FNPS for stream 1 funding. This stream is the one used to get a self-administered police service such as APS. We took this recommendation to Council, who were in favor of it and Chief was tasked with sending the letters out. The Province would be responsible for 48% and the Feds would be responsible for 52% of the funding. The next step is to formally approach APS to confirm that they would be willing to return to Saugeen, if the funding is available. We inquired and were informed that we could meet with APS in April and we fully intend to. In the meantime, the new provincial government is reviewing the Police Services Act and there is a requirement for OPP to establish police boards for First Nations, to address local priorities and proactive needs. We will be working with them in the near future.

Housing – Our Infrastructure Committee has been working on plans to move forward with future housing as well as community infrastructure. One of the exciting developments is that we are now in talks with Habitat for Humanity and are in the initial stages of planning to build our first Habitat for Humanity home in Saugeen.

Treaty 72 and Title Claim — As we have all been made aware, we are finally going to trial starting in April of this year. We are told that the trial process could take anywhere from 1 to 3 years and, maybe many more years, depending on appeals, etc. We have been approached by the Federal, Provincial and Municipal governments to engage in a mediation process. This process started about 3 weeks ago and Letitia, Mike and myself were in Toronto for a week for the initial talks with Canada and Ontario. We, the SON, will be going ahead with negotiations even while the trial moves along. We have no intention of stalling the trial, especially after waiting so long for it. If the negotiations result in a positive settlement offer, we will be approaching our members for input.

Social Committee – Our Committee has been presented with an amazing proposal from Melissa Snowden, Food Bank Coordinator, to build a new structure in Saugeen. With much foresight ad thought going into this proposal, the food bank would only be 1 of the services offered in this new build. The vision is to have a food bank, community kitchen (including a teaching kitchen), a meeting room, a thrift store, a social area and maybe even a small laundry facility. She has already secured \$600,000 in funding for the new build and we are working on getting the additional funds that will be needed.

CAS – I am presently a member of the Bruce Grey Child & Family Services Steering Committee. We are working on a 5-year strategic plan. They are committed to working with us to follow a path that is set by the Nation to restore jurisdiction in this area. We will be coming to community for input in the near future.

DGR – We are targeting a community decision regarding the Deep Geological Repository by the end of this year. OPG will have meetings with community members to explain their thoughts and facts on the potential DGR. Having OPG address the community is simply part of our agreement to make sure our final decision is based on our members being fully informed. I've heard from some people who believe that our Chief and Council has sold them out and are "in bed" with OPG. This is simply not true. In order to maintain good faith, we need to make sure our members are basing their decision on all relevant facts. We must also keep in mind that, no matter what the decision is, as stewards of the land, we need to make sure we have a hand in dealing with the nuclear waste. If we vote yes, then obviously the low and intermediate level waste will be buried in the proposed DGR. If we vote no, we need to work on an alternative plan for the waste.

OPG – We have an interim agreement on legacy issues with OPG. Both Saugeen and Nawash communities will receive 2.5 million dollars each as a good will payment. This payment is for legacy issues only and has absolutely no bearing on the DGR decision.

Strategic Plan for Saugeen – We will be hammering out the strategic plan in the next little while. With the assistance of the FMGT Board, we will be working with community members, staff and leadership to identify our goals and develop the plans to ensure these goals are met. This plan will outline our vision, mission and values of our Nation. This is so important and so needed because, once complete, everyone In Saugeen will have a shared vision and shared goals.

Bruce Peninsula National Park – On the Parks Committee, we are working with Parks Canada to develop a management plan for Bruce Peninsula National Park and the Fathom Five National Marine Park. Our main goal is to preserve and protect the park and the wildlife that live within the park boundaries. At present we are working together toward either a co-management or cooperative management plan with Parks Canada. The results of the land claim settlement will give us a more focused direction but we are working closely to ensure that we are ready for whatever decision comes our way.

Those are the updates I have right now and will add or expand on them next month. Until then, stay safe, take care of each other and take care of yourself.

Let's do this Saugeen!

Gathering knowledge to build a community mental wellness strategy: A community driven initiative

A research office on wheels has rolled into town. This mobile research office is providing a hub to gather knowledge that will inform the development of a community wellness strategy. It's part of a unique study collaboration between the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) and Saugeen First Nation.

Ningwakwe George, Field Coordinator on the project and member of Saugeen First Nations said "like many communities, Saugeen First Nation experiences issues with mental health, substance use and violence. What affects one, affects all. We feel this, as a community, and we are endeavouring to address it as a community. We want Saugeen First Nation to be a safe, healthy and happy place for us all. We are taking an important step by participating in the CAMH project. The *community* provides the input; the *community* will devise solutions based on that input, and the *community* will benefit."

Parked next to the James Mason Memorial Culture and Recreation Centre in Saugeen First Nation, the mobile office is equipped with meeting and interview rooms, as well as computer stations for people to complete an online survey. Until February 2019, four research staff from Saugeen are interviewing community members and providing assistance in filling out the survey. The interviews and surveys are focused on people's experiences related to mental health and substance use, as well as any supports, services, and/or programs they have tried to access.

This project was approved by Band Council and has a local Community Advisory Circle that oversees the research and project activities. The research findings from approximately 30 interviews and 200-300 surveys will be shared back to community members of Saugeen First Nation in the spring of 2019.

"At this point, community members will be part of a process to review key research findings to determine a priority area and develop a community mental wellness strategy for and by people who can relate to the priority area," says Melody Morton Ninomiya, CAMH Project Scientist. This approach is known as participatory action research, where members of the community use arts-based methods to determine what is best for the community.

Saugeen First Nation is one of five First Nation communities participating in a larger project on community mental wellness strategies. Two communities have already identified their priority areas, including men's mental health and youth depression and anxiety, while others are in the early stages of creating a Community Advisory Circle and reviewing interview and survey questions. The project is funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-term Care's Health System Research Fund.


