



### Councillor Vernon Roote- Report

My first report as councilor in 2020. Thank you for your confidence and trust in me to represent Saugeen for this time. I would like to address a few issues that will effect decision making for council. **Communal decision making** (Indian Referendum Regulations, Can. Reg. 957) will be very important going forward in the following; land claim results, NWMO and regulations pertaining to the land, bylaws, and businesses (such as cannabis sales).

Our community (the people of Treaty 45 1/2 and 72) are governed by laws set forth through the Indian Act and Canadian law. This has been accepted by our people over time. Regaining control over our own law making and sovereignty is an important step for our future, should we pursue that direction.

Can. Reg. 957 within the Indian Act has reference to referendums being used for communal decision making. Band Council Resolutions made using a "survey" are not acceptable. The results of this kind of decision making can be a problem (i.e. Cannabis shops, how many should there really be, how should they be regulated, etc.) Indian Affairs is the body who approves Band Council Resolutions. So ultimately, their laws (Indian Act, provincial laws etc.) are the ones looking after our community for us, rather than our own laws at this time.

- 1. We have a great opportunity to make decisions important to our future. Some things to think about are...
- 2. If we are successful with the land claim, what structures do we have in place to look after the compensation from it?
- 3. How will we administer and protect the waters around our Saugeen Peninsula?
- 4. What will our financial structures look like?

What will our governing structures look like (for example creating an election and residency code, as well as administration policies)?

How will we manage the land for future generations?

Much of the above will also address the need to control the drug issues within the community. As well as increasing internal communication so everyone knows what is going on in our homeland. It is ultimately about our Sovereignty, and looking closely at what Anishinabek Sovereignty means. For example:

### Anishinabek Sovereignty (SONation)

To look after Mother Earth, and ourselves with our traditional governance Wampum Belt of 1764 Our Aboriginal rights remains Duluth Declaration proclaimed Sovereignty in Language, Tradition, Culture Community Acceptance

### Western Sovereignty (Canada)

To govern itself, supreme power, jurisdiction within its country
Royal Proclamation of 1763
Treaty was signed deals made but aboriginal right remains
Our government not acknowledged
Indian Act Remains
"General Laws of Application must prevail"
unless we make our own

Our community already demonstrates an excellent ability to make communal decisions as we did in the OPG DGR vote this past January. As well as in our elections, such as this past September, which we successfully held despite the COVID-19 Pandemic. I almost forgot, the portfolios I'm involved with are; Policing, Governance, Legacy funding, Great Lakes Fisheries, Parks Canada, and Advisory team (land claim).

There is good news in our infrastructure development on our new band office, and two official ball diamonds for recreation. We have funds in our Revenue Account in Ottawa from Own Source Revenue (OSR, Approx. 9 million), from Energy Projects (Approx. 7 million). These funds will enable ongoing administrative fees to be used and applied to go into the appropriate accounts by following budgets as set out.

So, what am I saying? We must continue to look at the **Big Picture** rather than the day to day issues that prevent us from moving forward. We also need to support one another. Self-destructive behaviors, trauma, substance abuse and many other issues are faced by our community. Engaging in lateral violence, enabling, creating negativity, gossip and so on can keep the circle of abuse going, But, we mustn't forget there are those that are living in a positive and productive way within this land set aside for us by our ancestors.

Our community has survived soooo much and is strong. We have the ability to create a beautiful future for our people and our land. I just can't understand why hate and jealousy are front and center at times. Let's all please work together to create a good place to live for our future generations.

### Aanii, Boozhoo Community of Saugeen:

First off, I would like to say a Chi-Miigwetch for entrusting and electing me to sit in a leadership role for our community. I am committed to helping Saugeen move forward in a healthy and positive manner for the betterment of the community in all areas.

Since the elections in August, I have jumped in feet first. To be sitting in this new role, I have taken the initiative to educate and work with past council to get brought up to speed about issues that are currently taking place and what our role as Chief & Council is to make *fact informed decisions* for the positive progress of Saugeen. Learning the ins and outs of the Finance policy & Governance policy to ensure that I am following the Code of conduct and chain of command within my role as an elected official with Saugeen First Nation. I have attended every council meeting to date and all other committee meetings that required my attention.

#### Here's a snapshot of what has happened thus far:

- Saugeen Chief & Council had our week long retreat in Southampton at the Quality Inn where we as a leadership were brought up to speed on current issues and also received Program Manager updates and what their departments all entail and how we as leadership can support our frontline workers within our capacity.
- Saugeen and Nawash have come to an end with the hearing of the closing arguments for the Treaty 72 Land claim. These were live broadcasted for the communities to be witness to the closing arguments on YouTube. I hope that our community took full advantage to hear the closing arguments and that we hope to have a decision by early next year.
- The beautiful ball diamonds have been completed and handed over to Saugeen. I look forward to seeing our community playing baseball and getting together next summer for some fun filled events.
- The Saugeen Governance building is expected to be completed December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Moving departments over and settling in, is expected to be completed for the new year. Due to covid restrictions, there haven't been definitive plans for a community grand opening. Please watch for announcements in the coming months.

- \* Territorial Resource Committee





Good morning, many of us experienced power outages yesterday and possibly still continuing today. This is a reminder that when the power goes out and then returns, a lot of the water treatment equipment, sump pumps, sewage pumps in your homes, buildings may have been affected. The loss of power and then a reboot such as water pumps may dislodge particulate matter in the lines and come out your faucets and discolour your water for a short time. The other factor is that most equipment have timers so that time setting will not be when it was set to recycle.

Sewage pumps need power and if there is no power then an issue may come back to affect your health and safety.

#### Recommendations

- 1. Once power is restored, have someone go around and flush the water lines if the building or homes are on their own power supply. Those First Nations with water treatment plants should be okay if their generators started up and no pressure was lost.
- 2. Please remind community members that water treatment filters and equipment may have time settings on them and to check them and rest to proper time so they work as designed. Usually on top of the tall propane type filters.
- 3. Sump Pumps do not work when there is no power. Remind community members to always raise any valuable furniture and items off the basement floors or crawlspaces floors. Do not store directly on the floor. Otherwise make sure members get or borrow a generator to utilize their sump pumps.
- 4. Raised tile beds usually mean a pump is used to pump effluent to the tile bed based on soil conditions. If you have no power that usually means your sewage pump also doe not have power and therefore sewage effluent will not be pumped out of the pump chamber. This may cause a possible backup. Once again use a generator or minimize flushing even if you are on the community water treatment plant which will allow for pressurized water.
- 5. Winds bring down trees, and can be a safety hazard if you attempt to move the fallen tree, branches or move power lines. Please do not do anything without getting your Public works personnel to at least check it first or get a professional in to assess. Have a crew go around and check on elders and homes to ensure no safety hazards exist as soon as possible. Some community members are not venturing outside and therefore unaware of any potential damage or hazards. Post on facebook, tweet it, call around to neighbours and families, friends.
- 6. Check with the health centre about community members that need assistance or have medical equipment that needed power to run.
- 7. Food supplies will be compromised if the not properly kept out of the danger zone. Remind persons to not open the fridges unless they have to keep the refrigerated foods cold and not eat any food that is doubtful.
- 8. Remind members not to run any generators in confined spaces such as the house or closed garages during power outages or even when power is on. This also goes for propane heaters which should never be used inside without adequate ventilation.

9. For those with power and neighbours that don't have it, be mindful that Covid-19 protocols should be maintained. Wear masks and try to social distance.

10. Enusre these types of emergencies are in your emergency response plan and plan for them. Mother Nature can be very tricky at itmes.

If in doubt with your water supply or is discoloured, do not drink it. Flush your taps, each one including the bath or shower until it runs clear. Boil your water if you are concerned about bacti in it.

Please ensure community members contact the band office if they have any issues or your emergency control group.

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Winds are and have caused major issues in the past. Emergency backup power is always an option for many but not financially possible for others. Care about your neighbours.

If you have any questions please contact us.

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Please check with Hydro one for updates of when power will be restored in your area if need be. Put the app on your phone to monitor progress.

### **Mathew Solomon Mandawoub**

### WWI

There were few soldiers that served for Canada in both WWI and WWII. One that did just that was Mathew Solomon Mandawoub.

Mat was born at Saugeen First Nation on October 26, 1896 to Alexander (Elec) Mandawoub Solomon and Elizabeth Mitchell. Upon his father's death he moved to Cape Croker with his mother. He was working as a farmer when he decided to enlist in the 160<sup>th</sup> Bruce Battalion. It was December of 1915 and the call went out throughout Bruce County for volunteers for the forming of a new battalion from the County.

In May of 1916 the platoons from across the county gathered in Walkerton and proceeded to London to begin training. That October with a strength of approximately 1,200 they sailed to England from Halifax aboard the S. S. Metagama. Intense training began in camps at Bramshott and Whitely in south central England. There was a long wait of more than a year before the 160<sup>th</sup> men were sent as replacements to join various Canadian regiments at the wars front in France.

It was March 28, 1918 that Mathew joined the 18<sup>th</sup> Battalion from Western Ontario. The 18<sup>th</sup> had served in many of the earlier battles including Passchendaele, Vimy Ridge, Hill 70 and others. In August of 1918, they were a part of the push to move the Germans out of France and end the war. This was known as the 100 Days Offensive.

By October 1918 the German army was being beaten back by the allies and had reached the city of Cambrai. This battle lasted 3 days and both sides had casualties of more than 10,000.

It was only a couple of months later, on August 14<sup>th</sup> that he finished his shift at 13:30 hours and was given a pass until 07:00 hours on the 15<sup>th</sup>. He never did report for his shift and was identified as "absent without leave".

It was 5 days later that the body of a soldier was found in the Keating Cut off Villiers St. near Cherry Beach in Toronto's east end. The body was found in front of the Russsell Construction Company dock by a night watchman.

A Court of Inquiry was held on September 10, 1941 and heard 4 witnesses.

The night watchman explained the details of finding him.

The commanding officer reported going to the morgue and identifying him.


A Toronto policeman reported that he had gone to the scene and had the corpse removed to the morgue. He notified the Military Police.


The 4<sup>th</sup> witness was the Toronto coroner Dr. W. J. O'Hara, who presented the information from an autopsy done by Dr. H. Erb who found "death due to drowning".

The finding of the three Military officers of the Court was as follows: "The court gave no finding".

"According to the evidence", the inquiry is "unable to place the blame on any individual", and that "Pte. Solomon was not on duty."

He was awarded a Memorial Cross and his personal effects were sent to his wife. His remains were delivered to Southampton and the local funeral director, Mr. H. Harmer, provided the required services for his burial in the Saugeen Village Cemetery.
